Program Year	9-month school year that follows the district calendar, with the possibility of extended school year (ESY) as per IEP	Most programs are year-round, with major holidays off. You must notify the program if your young adult will be absent due to a family vacation.
Absences	Regular attendance encouraged	Regular attendance required. Adult programs do not receive funds when participants are absent.
Staff to Student Ratios	Varies by class	Can be 1:1, 1:3, 1:16 or up to 1:15 depending on funding and program type.

Lunch Services	Cafeteria on site and free lunch programs available.	None provided. Program participants are expected to provide their own lunches.
Nursing Services	Provided as needed	Provided in specially designated adult programs. Licensed programs may cover glucose testing, g-tube nourishment, colostomy care. Requires a doctorapproved nursing plan & annual staff training
One-on-one Assistant	Possible, if IEP team deems it necessary.	RCEB may fund & monitor a one-on-one assistant in very rare situations, with intention of fading within 90 days.
Adaptive P.E.	Provided, as specified in IEP.	Varies by program.
Speech, PT, OT	Provided if IEP team determines need.	Speech therapy is no longer readily available. Programs may offer OT, usually funded creatively.
Regulatory Oversight	State Department of Education and State/Federal Mandates	State Department of Developmental Services via RCEB, Department of Labor and/or Department of Social Services (Community Care Licensing)
